The Minnesota Landscape Arboretum was the setting for the North Central Chapter of the

Health Physics Society's (NCCHPS) fall topical meeting, "Reflections on the 2006 Polonium Poisoning Event," 19 October 2007. Mike Lewandowski, then chapter presi-

dent-elect, and Andy Kiorpes, president of the Northland Chapter of the Society of Toxicology (NLSOT), welcomed attendees to the joint meeting of the NCCHPS and the NLSOT.

Lewandowski thanked meeting sponsors and recognized NCCHPS members Gen Roessler and David Paulu for their roles in bringing the meeting to reality. HPS President-elect Dick Toohey kicked off the day-long meeting with an interesting and detailed summary of the radiobiology and toxicology of polonium. That presentation set the stage for Michael Bailey from the United Kingdom's Health Protection Agency to provide a compelling and engaging chronology of the 2006 London polonium poisoning event and explanation of the Health Protection Agency's role in the response to that event.

Bailey was awarded the chapter's annual Robert G. Wissink Memorial Lectureship and his attendance at the chapter meeting was made possible through the generous support by contributions from Nuclear Management Company, Mavo Clinic, and 3M. Bailey held the audience in rapt

attention and then fielded numerous questions. Due to the ongoing criminal investigation of the poisoning, Bailey had to defer answers to some of the questions.

After a short break where attendees spoke personally with Toohey and Bailey, visited sponsoring affiliate members, and refilled their coffee cups, Paul Schmidt from the Wisconsin Radiation Protection Section provided a brief summary of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention's response, using materials graciously provided by Bob Whitcomb.

HPS Media Relations Liaison Kelly Classic discussed the HPS Media Relations activities that coincidentally anticipated the U.S. media interest in the story and positioned the HPS to be able to swiftly meet the media's needs.

Following a break for lunch, Duane Hall (retired 3M) and Fred Entwistle, from 3M, reflected on the manufacture and use of static-eliminating devices containing ²¹⁰Po.

Dennis Walter, from Minnesota Homeland Security and Emergency Management, invited the audience to participate in the Minnesota Citizen's Corp as a way to serve our local communities.

Another short break allowed the attendees to visit with representatives from Global Dosimetry, Image Technology, and Philotechnics, who along with MGI Pharma sponsored the meeting.
